For the word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing to the division of soul and of spirit, of joints and of marrow, and discerning the thoughts and intentions of the heart. # 1) From Hometown Prophet To Big City Preacher

- A) After Jesus miraculously escaped bodily harm from a furious hometown mob in Nazareth (Luke 4:29-30), He travels about 20 miles "down to Capernaum, a city of Galilee" (4:31). Capernaum was a thriving fishing and agricultural "city" located on the Northern side of the Sea of Galilee.
- B) Unlike smaller villages, Capernaum had its own synagogue, possessed a Roman military presence, and was located on a significant East/West trade route which included a customs tax/toll station.
- C) Significantly, Capernaum was the hometown of Peter (4:38, note also Bethsaida, his family birth-town in John 1:44), and became the hometown of Jesus (cf. Matthew 9:1, Mark 2:1). Capernaum is the center "base of operations" for Jesus Christ and His disciples in the Galilee region.
- D) Jesus comes to Capernaum and teaches in the local synagogue (4:31), a typical practice for a Jewish Rabbi (master-teacher). Synagogues were places of worship, but also locations to which the entire community flocked for public discourse, political debate, educational classes, and even non/neutral religious community events (marketplace, local hang-out).

## 2) Thunderstruck!

- A) Jesus' teaching is radically different than the typical teaching which both bored and burdened the listener (cf. Mark 1:22). Jesus' teaching causes astonishment (lit., 'thunderstruck'), because of His "authority" (4:32).
- B) Most people depended on synagogue teachers for their Bible knowledge because the common person did not read much, and "books" were rare. Synagogue teachers were highly respected because God had 'blessed them' with education so they could bless others with their 'understanding.'

- C) Religious leaders in Jesus' day loved lengthy explanations and quotes about the Bible from respected scribes and teachers. While God's Word was deeply respected, the significance of a master Rabbi's school of thought (Hillel, Eliezer, Zakkai) became most discussed in the synagogue.
- D) But Jesus was different. He wasn't just talking about the Bible. He took words on a page and brought them to life! The Word of God was alive when Jesus taught. Clearly, in His new public ministry, Scripture was the most important ingredient for Jesus (note 4:4, 8, 12, 18-19, 25-27).

# 3) The Power of God Brings Freedom

- A) As Jesus teaches in the synagogue, a power encounter happens with a man controlled by a demonic spirit (4:33-34). The demon screams out, "Ha!," a kind of explosive-scream meant to repulse someone, a "get away from me!," or "go away!" yell from fear or shock.
- B) Clearly, the demonic world knows Jesus (cf. James 2:19). The demon even names Jesus and proclaims Jesus is "the Holy One of God" (Luke 4:34). We are seeing the truth of spiritual battle (cf. Ephesians 6:11-12) and the power of God's Word unleashed by Jesus.
- B) Whenever God's Word is alive, it is at work bringing light into darkness. The Word of God brings release from bondage and sin, brings freedom to those in sin's grip, and delivers liberty from dark influences and possession.
- C) Take careful note of how Jesus brings freedom for this helpless unnamed man controlled by a demonic influence (4:35). There is no dramatic Hollywood head-spinning exorcism or vomit-exploding writhing. Jesus speaks and the demon departs. His Word is power (cf. Hebrews 4:12-13).
- D) The power of Jesus is immediate and authoritative. He silences a demonic world and speaks life into those trapped by death. Despite the demonic threat, Jesus throws out the demon without harming the man (4:35). The 'shock and awe' was immediate, and word spreads quickly (4:36-37).

# 3) Power to the People

- A) Seeing the power of Jesus over the demonic world was amazing (4:36), but also triggered a genuine hope for "Simon," who invites Jesus into his home because his mother is deathly ill (fever/dysentery, 4:38).
- B) You might know Simon from his better known name, Peter. This is Peter and Jesus' first recorded engagement. In Peter's home (about 200 feet from the synagogue), Jesus "rebukes" (speaks a warning toward, 4:39) her sickness and miraculously heals Peter's mother. Like any good Jewish mother, she immediately begins serving and caring for her guests.
- C) People flock to Jesus, and He cares for them tenderly. Jesus heals common people, women, and the unimportant. He silences dark declarations, but the question of His identity looms large. Who is Jesus of Nazareth?
