You shall tell your son on that day, saying, 'It is because of what the LORD did for me when I came out of Egypt.'

And it shall serve as a sign to you on your hand, and as a reminder on your forehead, that the law of the LORD may be in your mouth; for with a powerful hand the LORD brought you out of Egypt.

~Exodus 13:8-9 (NASB)

1) A Meal To Share

- A) As Moses leads God's people out of Egypt after 430 years of captivity (Exodus 12:33-41), God once again reminds the people to always remember their freedom from slavery through the remembrance of Passover (12:42).
- B) The Passover meal though, was not meant for everyone! Only those who belonged to God's people (the Jews) were to eat the Passover meal (12:43 & 45).
- C) However, if a slave (12:44) or foreigner "converted" (12:44 & 48-49) to faith in God, they were to be circumcised (the "sign" of the covenant, cf. Genesis 17:9-14), and only then could they join Israel in celebrating Passover (12:46-47).

- D) The meal was to be celebrated in every home in Israel (12:46), a shared experience for all the Jews of the unblemished and unbroken lamb!
- E) Israel was obedient in their observation of the Passover and of all its regulations, distinguished as God's own people (12:50-51).

2) A Meal To Eat

- A) Passover was a meal, meant to be eaten. Both the lamb and unleavened bread were a physical testimony of Israel's salvation from Egypt (13:3), and marked off the beginning of each year for the Jews (13:4).
- B) The blood on the doorposts of every Jewish home was a clear connection to the lamb being consumed inside the home. The sacrifice of the lamb was more than a simple symbol, it was a spiritual reality, as much a part of the life of the Jew as what they are and drank.
- C) By eating the offering, the Jews identified completely with the sacrifice which God provided for salvation. The lamb and the bread were symbols of salvation, a connection between a gracious God and His people (13:5-7).

3) A Meal To Explain

- A) Whenever Passover occurred, the heads of the family were to tell the story behind the symbols (13:8), and remember God's goodness again and again.
- B) These symbols were to be at the "forefront" of both the mind and the actions (head and hand, 13:9) for every person of God forevermore (13:10), a constant reminder of God's saving power in all the world!
